I'm a father to two wonderful(ly hectic) kids. After growing up in Chicago, I married and moved to San Francisco, where I've worked remotely since 2014. For over 25 years, I've been building for the Web, working almost exclusively within tiny development teams from 3 to just me. I've learned a lot about a lot.

I craft user interfaces from conception to deployment, but I've also maintained large relational databases, built complex server-side systems, and managed production infrastructure too (though I don't enjoy that last part).

I mention this because, as a product designer, I use my understanding of the entire system to make better design decisions. I shape features with foresight well beyond the interface.

I try to bring delight to everything I create. Delightful interfaces, whimsical little touches, memorable interactions, writing that hits. Amidst all the AI-generated, cookie-cutter stuff being churned out today, it feels like delight is being left behind.

A few other notes about me:

- I design directly in HTML and CSS. I don't translate between design and implementation.
- I've picked up Ruby on Rails and Hotwire over the past year. With my decades-long background in other languages and frameworks (like C# and .NET), I've found the transition quite smooth (Thanks DHH and co!)
- I embrace constraints in all of my work. I'm a huge fan of No Build. Of plain old HTML, CSS, and Javascript. Of removing all the unnecessary extra that seeps into technology today.
- I am a voracious writer. From <u>three books</u> to <u>100 blog posts</u>, help docs to technical wikis, headline copy to a label, I love to write. I try to be clear, approachable, and empathetic. A sprinkle of humor when it feels right too.

I know this is a unique, highly sought-after role and company, but I think I've got what it takes. It's also a role that feels perfect for where I am in my career.

It was there where, in 2008, I began building an issue tracker called <u>DoneDone</u> for much the same reason you built Basecamp: we needed something better for our clients. I wore **all** the design and development hats with DoneDone for 15 years. It's my life's work.

Last fall, my business partner and I sold it. This gets me back to that Hill Chart.

Now, at 45, I am seeking focus on what I love to do the most: **Designing thoughtful interfaces and experiences while writing beautiful code**. I relish the process of starting from nothing and getting to everything. I enjoy riffing ideas with a teammate to get to a better, often surprising place. I love creating beautiful things. It's my natural high.


